# My 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary – By Basia

Vintage!

25 years ago, I had an aneurysm that burst. I had a weird ringing in my brain, like a church bell.

My husband rang for an ambulance. They came straight away, the bleeding was quite slow, my talking didn't change right away.

Luckily, my **children** were at their **grandparents'** house, as it was **half term**!

I had a scan straight away and I was sent to the Royal Free hospital. They couldn't operate on me straight away - the bleeding had to stop. I had an operation to clip the artery six days later.

I was in hospital for six weeks, I couldn't speak,
I was very low; I felt like my life was over, I
couldn't work, my children couldn't speak to
me, only my husband. Social life over.

I felt like I was saved because I saw a Speech and Language Therapist twice a week. Every time I went to see the therapist I cried.

I also had an au-pair. He was learning English, like I had to again, so we practiced every day together.

**Luckily**, my Speech and Language Therapist sent me to a **new charity**, **Connect.** They had a **counsellor who had aphasia too** and it **really helped a lot**. This charity **helped me** to get **more confident** and gave me **more conversation opportunities** because it was made up of **other people like me**.

For **16 years** I facilitated **drop-in**, **women's group**, and the **newsletter**.

I trained **professional people** (doctors, nurses, care workers) and supported **research** from **different institutes**.

The charity had a **head office** and **lots of staff**, its focus was on **education**, **research** and **rehabilitation**. It was **too much** and **Connect sadly collapsed**.

**Luckily**, through **Sally McVicker**, a **new charity was born** - **Aphasia Re-Connect**.

I was involved straight away.



I'm sure 25 years ago if I did not have that au-pair, Speech and Language Therapist, Counsellor or Connect straight away my life would be completely different, I would be in a bad way.

# Spotlight on a Member - Nadia


#### A bit about who I am...

- I was born in Ladysmith, South Africa.
- In Africa I made and sold custom artwork.
- I moved to **England** for the **work opportunities**.
- From 2003 2018 I worked as a live-in carer for people with **dementia**.
- I have travelled to many different countries including Africa, Italy, Spain, France, Germany, and Columbia.



### My family

- I have a **son** who lives in **Columbia** and a **daughter** who lives in **Crystal Palace.**
- My **Dad** was from **Naples** and my **Mum** is from **Rome**.
- My Mum now lives in South Africa (Ladysmith) and my auntie lives in Italy (Rome).



### When I had my stroke... 2018

- I was at work in Guildford when it happened. It was 9pm... I didn't get help until 10am the next day when my client's friend found me and called an ambulance.
- I was due to travel to Italy the next week and I was due to visit my Mum in Africa for 6 months (with a surprise visit to Australia!).
- I was in hospital for a few days in Guildford before moving to Croydon hospital to be nearer my daughter. My stay here was 3 months.
- After my hospital stay, I had support from 2 Speech and Language Therapists for 11 weeks.
- I finally visited Africa again in Jan 2020 but go stuck there for 11 months due to Covid!



# Spotlight on a Member - Nadia

### My experience of Aphasia

Things that have changed...

- **Italian** is my **first language**, since my stroke I **struggle** speaking in **Italian**.
- Most of my family only speak Italian so this can be **difficult** for us.
- Sometimes finding the word I want to say.
- I can say most **numbers**, but number six and seven I find difficult.
- I have good memory for dates but find them easier to write than say.
- I am a good reader but **reading aloud** is tricky.

### It is helpful to...

- Write things down
- Use my phone to read aloud Italian messages. Also using videochat!
- Using pictures and images.

# Aphasia Re-connect: how they have helped me.

I go to lots of groups run by Aphasia Re-Connect.

- **Tuesday**: I've started going to **Bromley** drop-in.
- Wednesday: I go to the Re-Connect at City.
- Thursday: I go to the Southwark dropin every week. This is my favourite group as we always find topics to connect over and have a good chat!
- **Friday**: Sometimes I go to the online music group. In the afternoon, I go to the Croydon drop-in group.

These groups are **very important to me**.

I feel supported from all the staff, members, volunteers, and students.

I also help them!

## Hi everyone!

It's **fantastic** to be **introduced** to the **wider Aphasia Re-Connect community.** 

My name is **Corinna** and, for **over a year**, I have **volunteered weekly** at **Aphasia Re-Connect's Music group**.

### What does my role involve?

- Firstly, I present the music choices, submitted
   by members, to the whole group.
- I take each member's vote, which dictates the order in which they're played.
- We then listen to the music, two at a time!
- Usually, the music video is played so members can enjoy the visuals as well as the audio.
- Everyone is put into smaller breakout rooms after every two songs.

- My role also includes facilitating my assigned room.
- Individuals in the room would have scored the two songs (out of 10), so I note down the scores and work out the average.
- We then all discuss what we like and didn't like about what was played – sometimes the conversations can get quite heated!

### Why do I volunteer?

- Participating in the music group each Friday is a fun way to start the weekend. I have loved
  getting to know the group's members and co facilitators everyone always has interesting
  stories to tell.
- Each week we play a huge variety of music. We all have such different tastes, so I learn something new each time.
- I have also had the opportunity to understand more about Aphasia and Aphasia Re-Connect's important work in supporting people with the condition.

# Visit to the National Portrait Gallery – By Ginia



I arrived early so I had the chance to admire again Tracy Emin's magnificent bronze doors depicting 'Everywoman' and echoing Ghierti's bronze doors at Florence Cathedral Baptistry.

The **group**, **led by Alison**, gathered in the **new atrium** which was light and airy; friendly staff greeted us and asked us what we wanted to see. We started at the top of the Gallery.

The portraits of the Tudor monarchs have been rearranged and re-labelled to highlight themes like Women in Power.

From there, we dropped down a floor and wandered through galleries filled with formal, meticulously painted 18th-century portraits—aristocrats posed with their wives, children, servants, and dogs, all designed to showcase their wealth and status.

Some of us were **reminded of the portraits** we had seen at the **Wallace Collection before Christmas**.

Then, in **contrast**, we looked at **self-portraits** by **artists**—it's interesting how many choose to **paint** themselves.

The austere portrait of **Barbara Hepworth** holding a block of stone, the flamboyant **Mirror**, **Mirror** by **Doris Zinkeisen** in full makeup, **Sir Joshua Reynolds** gazing into the distance, and the more abstract portrayal by Frank Auerbach—we all had our favourites, so many different styles!

We **couldn't leave** without seeing **portraits** of **celebrities**.

It was **fascinating** to see how **photographs** and **digital images** were used—from a video of a sleeping **David Beckham** to a life-size pastel of **Judi Dench** and, a group favourite, a hologram of the late Queen.

There was **so much more to explore**, but time was up, leaving us with **plenty to reflect on**.
